

Words from the Warden's Cell



God bless and keep you safe from sickness and pain. As I write this there are great cities and nations reeling from the Coronavirus. In a conversation I had only half-hour ago with my previous medical doctor, Dr. Clyde Keys, now retired from practice of medicine, he explained to me that this virus takes on a different mutation in each geographical location. He has done some extensive research on this and can explain why Italy and Spain are having the worst time of it. Those two nations have the more virulent strain of the virus. So far, only the US and Germany have the lowest infection rate because we caught the milder mutation. It goes without saying the virus, like any other, will mutate the more it is spread. It's imperative that we follow the safety guidelines posted in most of the media. Dr. Keys and I have been good friends for almost forty years, and I trust his thoroughness in any research he does. I attribute my good health at my age to his diagnoses and care.

How many times did dear old mom tell us, "Wash your hands after you touch things outside or in the house. Don't dig in your ears or pick your nose! Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze! And don't talk into each other's faces! Above all, don't step in something and track it in the house! And now, into the bathtub you go!!" Ah, the innocence of nostalgia.

And now we're at the brink of watching out for our own health. I know we try at it the best we can. I want to say we should pray about it, but how effective was that during the Black Plagues of the middle ages or the 1918 flu pandemic? No one can say either, that it didn't help. But self- isolation and keeping distances (six feet) from others increases our chances of not spreading this thing and its ability to mutate into a stronger form.

On my early morning grocery shopping I find more people about the supermarket than in safer times. Some are wearing masks. Others pause and wait for others to pass. With the older men I smile, nod, give way and even pass the peace sign. I was so delighted when I smiled and said good morning to two Mexican girls and they beamed back at me with looks of joy and relief. In these ways we're not isolating ourselves. Just showing friendly gestures with a smile speaks the deeper language of caring for others. I won't forget those two Mexican girls for a long time. They were still filled with that look of hope and expectation in their new home.

Keep the faith with us my dear parishioners, and wash your hands.

It is in the times of great trials and tribulations that we as one church come together as a worshiping community to see each other, to touch each other, and to be present to one another. This COVID-19 pandemic requires that we change our day-to-day routines and I've struggled with how I can be present to you.

But what I know, understand, and have experienced about small churches (Holy Spirit falls into this category) is that we are a family. We take care of one another. We are good at that. And what I know about this congregation is that you have been taking care of one another for a long time, with and/or without clergy. This congregation is resilient. This congregation will come through this pandemic with flying colors.

If you have the technology capability, please avail yourself of the church links that are streaming services. I understand that the diocesan website also has a link of parishes in Oregon that are doing the same. Consider this activity a road-trip of sorts across the diocese and country in search of liturgical comfort and love.

If you do not have the technology to engage in on-line services, keep doing what you've always done. Maybe it is reading the Daily Office. Maybe it is reflecting on scripture through the Forward Movement Day by Day publication. Spend time in prayer. Listen to your heart. Maybe a specific word such as guidance, patience, resilience, determination, or calm that can quiet your anxieties and give you peace.

I do not know how long we will be living in this altered state of reality. But this is an opportunity to be quiet. To learn to become comfortable with silence. Psalm 46:10 reads, "Be still and know that I am God." I have always found comfort in that verse and in the Psalms. I commend to you the beloved Psalm 121.
